





Whenever and wherever the history of Rotary is retold, one should not fail to begin with the remarkable story of Paul Percy Harris, the father and founder of the world's first and largest volunteer service movement.

On the evening of Thursday, 23rd February 1905, this lonely bachelor lawyer, as he then was, from Chicago, Illinois, USA, met with his three business associates, namely Silver Schiele, Gustavus Loehr, and Hiram Shorey, for a meeting, where he proposed the formation of a club different from any other but based on "a straightforward plan of mutual co-operation and informal

At the behest of the International Association Board in March 1916, a sixteen-member committee was appointed to explore the extension of Rotary in Latin America. Three Tampa, Florida, club members chartered the Rotary Club of Havana, Cuba, in April 1916. Cuba was thus the first Latin American and non-English speaking country to receive Rotary, followed two years later by Uruguay, South America (Rotary Club of Montevideo) in 1918. In India, the first Rotary Club was started in Calcutta in September 1919 by an English man, R. J. Coombes; it received its charter in January 1920.

In Continental Europe, Rotary found its way first in Paris in August 1918 through US military officers who founded the Allied Rotary Club in France until the "real" Rotary Club of Paris was started in April 1921. Rotary entered Madrid, Spain, two years later, in October 1920. It then spread to Oslo, Copenhagen, Amsterdam, Milan (1923), Vienna (1925), and Hamburg (1927). Rotary continued to spread rapidly as the First World War ended. The first club in Asia, Manila in the Philippines, was launched in July 1919, followed by Shanghai, China, in the same month, July 1919, and Tokyo, Japan, in October 1920. In March 1921, the International Association of Rotary Board asked two prominent Canadian Rotarians - Col. J. Layton Ralston of Halifax and Col. James W. Davidson of Calgary to introduce Rotary to Australia and New Zealand. accomplished their allotted task in four months.

Rotary reached the African continent by the south in 1921, sixteen years after Paul Harris had founded the first club in Chicago, USA, on 23rd February 1905. This was made possible by an American locomotive engineer stationed in Johannesburg, South Africa; he had been a former Rotarian in his hometown of Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania, USA, and so was able to convince his all-white business friends numbering forty-two to form the Rotary Club of Johannesburg in April 1921.

In 1928 the R.I. Board gave Col. Davidson (then aged 66) the sole mandate "to add the missing links in the chain of Rotary Clubs between Europe and Asia. Accompanied by his wife Lillian and young daughter Marjory, he set sail from Montreal on 23 August 1928, passing through Turkey, where he was not successful; then Greece, where the first organisational meeting of the Rotary Club of Athens was held on 14th December 1928. Davidson moved on to Egypt, and within two weeks, he concluded the effort begun by Rotary headquarters by convening an organisational meeting of the Rotary Club of Cairo with twenty-two charter members; the club became official on 2nd June 1929, thus making Egypt the second Rotary country in Africa. The Cairo club quickly proposed introducing Rotary to six other Egyptian cities. Continuing his mission, Davidson moved on next to Palestine, Syria, across the desert to Iraq and then by steamboat to Bombay, India.

From India, Davidson, still travelling with his wife Lillian and young daughter Marjory, sailed to South Ceylon (now part of Sri Lanka), then to Burma, Malaya and Singapore, where the Rotary Club of Singapore was formed on the 6th of June 1930 with seventy-one charter members. Davidson continued his journey to the Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia), where he succeeded in forming the Rotary Club of Batavia (later Jakarta) with seventy charter members; Bandoeng with forty-five; Malang Club with thirty; and Medan with forty-seven.

We should not forget to mention that in the Far East, monarchs and other men of high standing, including princes, sultans, ministers and ambassadors, did not find it

derogatory to their dignity to join Rotary, and this further added to the prestige of the organisation. For example, when Davidson established the Rotary Club of Bangkok on 17th September 1930, five princes were among its seventy charter members, and the Charter President was His Royal Highness Prince Purachatra. successes of Davidson followed in Hong Kong, the Philippines, Japan, Korea and Formosa (now Taiwan), from where the family returned home to Vancouver in March 1931, i.e. two and a half years of journey covering about 240,000km.

Therefore, in the annals of Rotary, we conclude that the 1920s was the greatest decade in international expansion and that in less than ten years, the movement had spread to fifty new countries on all six continents. Not surprisingly, Jim Davidson was accorded recognition as Rotary's "Missionary Extraordinaire"; he died on 18 July 1933. Paul Harris died on 27 January 1947.

Today Rotary is a global network of 1.4 million neighbours, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change - across the globe, in our communities, and ourselves.

## FROM ROTARY DISTRICT 210 TO DISTRICT 9102

Rotary reached the African continent in the year 1921, sixteen years after Paul Harris had founded the first club in Chicago, USA on 23rd February 1905. An American locomotive engineer, a former Rotarian in his hometown of Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania, USA convinced his all-white business friends numbering forty-two to form the Rotary Club of Johannesburg in April 1921.

Within the next decade and a half, Rotary jumped over the Kalahari Desert, the Kilimanjaro Mountain, the Great African Lakes, and the Sahara to land on the Mediterranean shores of North Africa, reaching Cairo, Egypt on 2nd January 1929, through the effort of the Canadian Col. James W. Davidson; after that to Casablanca, Morocco; Algiers in Algeria; back south to Salisbury, Rhodesia (now Harare, Zimbabwe), and on to Nairobi, Kenya in the east, all in the same year 1930. Rotary's journey continued to Tunisia in 1935, Sudan in 1938 and finally to Senegal in West Africa, in 1939. Dakar would remain the Rotary lone star in the region's skies for seventeen (17) years after which period Rotary reached Cote d'Ivoire in 1956 and Cameroon and Chad in 1957, both French speaking countries.

The first English-speaking country in the region to receive Rotary was Ghana, the newly independent nation, through the initiative of an indigene, a peculiarly exciting history worth mentioning. In Ghana, Rotary was introduced through the singular effort of an African

(Ghanaian) Accountant named Michael Daniel Quist, who worked with the American oil company TEXACO in Accra and had previously studied in the UK where he got to know about Rotary through regular invitation by British Rotarians. Ironically, though. membership of the Premier Club, the Rotary Club of Accra, was dominated (73%) by white expatriates who were leaders in the then well-known businesses and professions. A minority Ghanaian membership of seven was included in this group - three politicians, two members of Parliament from the ruling party and the third, the Economic Adviser to the Prime Minister, Kwame Nkrumah.

The extension of Rotary throughout the English-speaking West African countries would be achieved mainly through the initiative of the Rotary Club of Accra, under the leadership of Michael Daniel Quist. He spearheaded the Rotary Extension Campaign into Nigeria and organized Rotary Clubs of Kano, Lagos and Ibadan in Nigeria, and Freetown in Sierra Leone. Through his historical external family links in neighboring Togo he also introduced Rotary to that country. In Rotary year 1968-1969 there existed in our West African region only twenty-one (21) clubs with small numbers of Rotarians in twelve countries, that is seven (7) clubs in Nigeria, four (4) clubs in Ghana, and one in each of the remaining countries. Therefore the region did not qualify to be designated as a Rotary District.

The West African Rotarians, eager to build a viable regional Rotary community, started holding annual conferences; the first was held in Accra on 21-23 March 1968, attended by eleven (11) clubs coming from Ghana, Dahomey now Benin, Liberia, Mali, Nigeria, and Sierra Leone, Accra, Bamako, Cotonou, Freetown, Ibadan, Kano, Kumasi, Lagos, Monrovia. Takoradi. Tema. Four subsequent annual conferences followed at different venues. The fifth retook place in Accra on 8-12 March 1972 with the participation of the Rotary Clubs of Freetown, Monrovia, Enugu, Ibadan, Ikeja, Kaduna. Accra. Accra-West, Kumasi. Sekondi-Takoradi, Tamale, Tema, and Lome, the new club from Togo making it the seventh member-country.

The fifth Annual West African Conference, attended by R. I. President Ernst G. Breitholtz, represented the turning point for district status and through a balloting of majority of clubs Francois Amorin was selected as the District Governor-Nominee for the Rotary year 1973-1974 and subsequently formally elected the first District Governor of District 210.

Per the By-Laws of Rotary International, the District Governor must organize two events, namely the District Assembly and the District Conference, during his year in office.

During the first five-year period of District 210, club extension was stagnant; only three new clubs were created: Nouakchott in Mauritania, Abidjan-Cocody in Cote d'Ivoire (1978) and Banjul in The Gambia (1979). A decision by the R.I. Board in Rotary year 1976-1977 changed the numerical designation of District 210 to District 910 of which Rotarian Sam Okudzeto became the first Governor. As new countries

appeared on the West Africa Rotary map, Rotary extension gained momentum notably in Nigeria due to the oil boom. A single Governor could no longer discharge his duties effectively over such a vast geographical territory as D910. It became obvious that re-districting was the solution. R.I. ceded territory from D910 to form two new Districts – D911 and D915.

In the Rotary year 1991-1992, the R.I. Board added the number zero (0) to all existing districts worldwide, thus altering D910 to D9100. District 9100 constituted a larger part of the West African Sub-Region of Africa, south of the Sahara. It comprised fourteen countries: Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape Verde, Cote d'Ivoire, Gambia, Ghana. The Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Liberia, Mali, Niger, Senegal, Sierra Leone, and Togo. Indeed D9100 was at the time the largest geographic district in the Rotary world. There was the need for redistricting again of District 9100.

After a lengthy process, the Board of Directors of Rotary International, "agreed to reorganize the clubs in District 9100 into two new districts 9101 and 9102, effective 1 July 2013.

Ten years later, District 9102 will be redistricted into District 9103 (Benin, Niger & Togo) and District 9104 (Ghana) and from 1st July 2023. The history is yet to be told .... Watch This Space!

## FROM DISTRICT 9102 TO DISTRICT 9104

#### **DISTRICT 9102 IS BORN**

The journey of District 9102 commenced on July 1, 2013, after the Board of Directors of Rotary International, at its meeting on January 23-28, 2011, agreed to reorganize the clubs in District 9100 into two new districts, effective July 1, 2013, as follows:

- District 9101: Cape Verde, Senegal, Gambia, Mali, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Sierra Leone, Liberia, Burkina Faso, and Côte d'Ivoire
- District 9102: Ghana, Togo, Benin, and Niger

The new District 9102, begun its journey, which lasted exactly ten (10) years, with 66 clubs and 1,940 Rotarians.

### INVESTITURE OF FIRST DISTRICT GOVERNOR

The ceremony to invest the first District Governor Winfred A. Mensah was held at the Fiesta Royale Hotel, Accra, Ghana on July 13, 2013. ### INVESTITURE OF FIRST DISTRICT **GOVERNOR**

The ceremony to invest the first District Governor Winfred A. Mensah was held at the Fiesta Royale Hotel, Accra, Ghana on July 13, 2013. PFirstt were Past District Governor Francois Amorin (first District Governor, District 210 in 1973-74), Past Rotary International Director Sam Okudzeto (first District Governor, District 910 in 1977-78) and others.

The occasion set the path for increased efficiency in district administration and a foundation solid for sustained membership growth, impactful service projects, Rotary visibility and support for the Rotary Foundation in all four (4) member Countries of D9102.

#### MEMBERSHIP GROWTH

The requirement for a Rotary District is to have at least 75 clubs with a minimum of 2,700 Rotarians.

All the ten (10) District Governors led committed and enthusiastic Rotarians to prosecute the Rotary agenda and grow D9102 from 66 clubs with 1,940 Rotarians as at July 1, 2013 to 123 clubs with 3,146 Rotarians as at June 30, 2023.

The upward growth over the ten-year period of D9102 was achieved through meticulous planning and effective growth strategies underpinned mainly extension efforts (the formation of new clubs).



## THE NEED FOR RE-DISTRICTING OF DISTRICT 9102

Even though D9102 had its own growth agenda, the focus on membership growth in Africa in order to have and sustain a Rotary Zone was an underlying motivation for districts in Africa.

Africa had the status of a Rotary Zone from July 1, 2019, with Past Rotary International Director/Vice President Olayinka Babalola as the first Director. He played a pivotal role in the re-districting of D9102.

Some of the reasons for the previous re-districting (D9100 to D9101 and D9102) were still pertaining, albeit on a lower scale, particularly with geographical size (4 Countries) and language barrier (2 official languages). After the 2021 District Conference, a resolution was presented to the Board of Directors of Rotary International, who at its November 2021 meeting tentatively agreed to split District 9102 into Districts

A Re-districting committee was formed to work towards the attainment of the first condition. The second condition was waived due to the growth trends over the period.

## REASONS TO REJOICE AND FOR HOPE


Rotarians in D9102 have once again made a mark in Rotary by serving in various R.I positions and programmes.



# PRESIDENT OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

R. Gordon R. McInally is president of Rotary International. He was educated at the Royal High School in Edinburgh and at the University of Dundee, where he earned his graduate degree in dental surgery. He operated his own dental practice in Edinburgh until 2016. Gordon was chair of the East of Scotland branch of the British Paedodontic Society and has held various academic positions. He has also served as a presbytery elder, chair of the Queensferry parish congregational board, commissioner to the general assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Gordon joined Rotary in 1984 at age 26. A member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, he has served as president and vice president of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI). He has also served RI as a director and on several committees, including as an adviser to the 2022 Houston Convention Committee and chair of the Operations Review Committee.

Gordon says he looks forward to working with members to build new Rotary clubs and groups. "My vision is that Rotary should exist everywhere in a style to suit everyone who has the desire to be part of us and to help us do good in the world," he says.

Gordon is a patron of the UK-based nonprofit Hope and Homes for Children and led a partnership between that organization and RIBI to support children in Rwanda who had been orphaned in the genocide there. He is a patron of Trade-Aid, an initiative of the Rotary Club of Grantham Kesteven, Lincolnshire, England, that provides sustainable humanitarian aid to individuals, families, and businesses in the developing world. He is also an ambassador for Bipolar UK, a national mental health organization.

In his free time, Gordon enjoys rugby, good food and wine, and stick dressing, the traditional Scottish craft of making walking sticks.

Gordon describes The Rotary Foundation as "the fuel that provides the energy to do Rotary service." He and his spouse, Heather, also a Rotarian, are Paul Harris Fellows, Major Donors, and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation. They are also members of the Bequest Society.

Gordon wishes to dedicate his presidency to making the world a better place for his granddaughters, Ivy and Florence, to live and thrive.

#### **GUEST SPEAKER**

Lady Justice Georgina Theodora Wood, a retired Chief Justice of The Republic of Ghana, is a Member of The Council of State. She obtained an LLB degree from The Faculty of Law, University of Ghana, in 1970, and was called to The Ghana Bar in 1970.

She joined The Ghana Police Service in that same year and served as a Public Prosecutor for three years. In 1973, she was appointed as a Magistrate in The Judicial Service of Ghana, and rose through the various court structures to be sworn in office as the first female Chief Justice of The Republic.


Before her elevation to the position of Chief Justice, in addition to her duties as a Justice of The Supreme Court of Ghana, she additionally served as a sessional Justice of The Supreme Court of The Gambia. The premiere Lady Justice was Chief Justice for 10 years (2007-2017), making her the longest serving occupant of the position in the history of Ghana. During her tenure, as the incumbent office holder, she swore in office three Presidents of Ghana.

Chief Justice Wood retired honourably from office in 2017, after 47 years of dedicated public service to The Republic of Ghana. On retirement, by virtue of her qualification as the only living retired Chief Justice since the coming into force of the 1992 Constitution of The Republic of Ghana, she was appointed as the first retired Chief Justice to serve on The Council of State under The 4th Republic, by

His Excellency President Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo- Addo, President of The Republic of Ghana.

In 2007, President J A Kufuor, decorated her with the highest National Honour of The Order of The Star of Ghana. In 2008, The University of Ghana, conferred on her an LLD (honoris causa) Degree. She is honoured to be a Paul Harris Fellow.

#### **GUEST OF HONOUR**

#### **Education:**

Mr. Kufuor was called to the Bar at Lincoln Inn, London (1959-1961) and obtained a BA Honours Degree in Philosophy, Politics and Economics from Exeter College, University of Oxford (1961-1964). He also holds an MA in Economics from Oxford.

John Kufuor served two constitutionally-allowed terms as president of the Republic of Ghana from 2001–09.

During his presidency, he served as chairperson of the African Union (2007–08) during which he supervised the peaceful resolution of the electoral conflict in Kenya in 2008, among others. He was also chairman of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) for two terms

(2003–05) and saw to the successful negotiations that brought peace and major post-war reconstruction to Sierra Leone, Ivory Coast and Liberia.

Earlier in his career, he was twice elected Member of Parliament (1969–72) and (1979–81). He served as a Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs (1969-72), and represented Ghana's delegation to the United Nations (UN) in 1970; Secretary for Local Government; and chief legal officer and city manager of Kumasi, the second largest city in Ghana.

Under his presidency, Ghana witnessed the fastest growth in its history; attaining a Middle-Income status by 2006 much earlier than the projected year of 2015 as envisaged under her own development agenda and GDP growth reached a record 8.4% between 2007 and 2008, even in the midst of the international financial and economic crises.

He introduced a health insurance scheme, with free maternal care for pregnant women,

under which about 56% of the population was registered in its early years and also instituted the Free School Feeding programme to provide one nutritious meal a day for school children from kindergarten, (age four) to Junior High School, (age 16).

Under Kufuor, the Ghana's Agricultural Extension Services programme was reactivated and special attention paid to educating cocoa farmers on best practices. As a result between 2002 and 2005, cocoa production in Ghana, the world's second largest producer, doubled from 350,000 tons to 734,000 tons a year, an all-time record in more than a century of cocoa production in the country.

Using similar measures, production of food crops, livestock and fish increased tremendously and poverty levels in Ghana were cut in half early in his administration.

Under his watch, Ghana experienced a very robust infrastructural development in the areas of roads, schools and hospitals, among others.



#### Post his Presidency:

He is currently a member of the International Advisory Board of telecommunication giant, MTN of South Africa since 2019. From 2013 to 2016; he was a Commissioner for the Global Citizenship Commission charged by the UN with recommending updates to the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

In 2012, he founded John A Kufuor Foundation for Leadership, Governance and Development to mentor young people for leadership. In December 2013, he was appointed a UN Secretary General's Special Envoy on Climate Change in preparation for the 2015 Climate Summit: Paris COP 21. In 2011, he was named joint-winner of World Food Prize with former Brazilian President Lula da Silva.

Kufuor was one of 10 distinguished global leaders tasked to work on the reform of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund immediately after his presidency.

He has served as leader of several election monitoring delegations to several African countries under the auspices of the African Union and ECOWAS.

Kufuor has received numerous awards including; the Chatham House prize for good leadership by Queen Elizabeth II of Britain, Germany's highest national award the Bundesverskkreuz by former President Horst Kohler; Liberia's highest award of the Grand Cordon in the Most Venerable Order of the Knighthood of the Pioneers for helping to return peace to that country.

He has received several honorary doctoral degrees from universities in Britain, Nigeria, Ghana and South Korea.

DGN Nana Yaa has three daughters and six grandchildren. She loves reading and travelling.



Dear Governor David and Friends in Rotary:

My first visit to Ghana was in 1998, when I brought 67 Rotarians from the United States to participate in polio national immunization day activities. At that time, I was told that there were about 280 members of Rotary in Ghana. Over the next five years, I continued to bring Rotarians to Ghana for polio eradication, project funding, and to reunite with people we called friends. In total, I have now been to Ghana more than 15 times, and I have friends that I call family.

For the past 25 years, I have watched Rotary grow in Ghana; a steady, purposeful, and dedicated effort to build Rotary the right way. Your District and club leaders invited business, professional, and community leaders – People of Action - to join our ranks. Rotaractors were equal partners in our projects, polio activities, and fellowship. In turn, these Rotaractors aspired to join your clubs.

I have been lucky enough to see Rotary on six continents, but I am hard pressed to say that I have seen a better expression of Rotary, and better members of Rotary, than I have witnessed in Ghana. PAST DISTRICT GOVERNOR

## ADOTEI BROWN

Past District Governor Adotei Brown (PDG Adotei) passed away on November 13, 2022 after more than 38 years of perfect attendance and active service in Rotary. His sudden and unexpected demise caught many of his friends and Rotarians off guard. PDG Adotei will be fondly remembered, and sorely missed.

We Rotarians are vibrant and tireless. We impact the community. We change lives, not only here, but around the world. When PDG Adotei was the Chair of the Ghana National PolioPlus Committee of Rotary International, a team of paparazzi was sent from Rotary International to cover the Polio immunization days in Ghana. The result of this action won him an icon on the cover page of the most important document of Rotary International – the Manual of Procedure (MOP) in 2004.

Being a Past District Governor, he had a sharp and in-depth acumen of Rotary experience. He was more than 100 percent dedicated and committed to Rotary and was such a vast Rotary accolade.

His amazing persuasive approach to bring every member on board the rudiments of Rotary was just fantastic. He had the flare in leading members of the Club to understand what Rotary is all about.

PDG Adotei lived Rotary's motto of 'Service above Self'. He was a prominent Rotarian in Ghana and the Rotary world.

In 1984 he was inducted into the Rotary Club of Accra-West with a loaned classification of "Architecture" and served as a Director in all the Avenues of Service. He was elected as President of the Club in 1991-92 Rotary Year. He shared his vision with his fellow Rotarians and in 1999-2000, he was elected to the high office of Rotary International as a District Governor for Rotary District 9100 comprising of fourteen (14) West African Countries - Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape Verde, Cote d'Ivoire, The Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Liberia, Mali, Niger, Senegal, Sierra Leone and Togo. During this period, PDG Adotei supervised projects initiated by the various clubs in the sub-region.



The Rotary Club of Accra-West sponsored and supported PDG Adotei in his role of District Governorship and it was not only an honour to do so, but a source of immense pride and satisfaction for its members.

As far as possible, there was no Rotary event that PDG Adotei attended without being accompanied by his wife, Rotary Ann Mary.




